Order of Omega is a Greek Honor Society founded in 1959 at the University of Miami (OH). It recognizes the top 3% of Greeks in both fraternities and sororities who have excelled in the classroom and in leadership positions in the Greek community and on campus. It is only open to those Greeks who are at a junior standing or higher.

LEADERSHIP

One of the greatest benefits to joining a fraternity is the amazing opportunity to become a leader in your organization and within the campus community. Greek students hold a majority of leadership roles on campus outside of Greek Life. Some of the many organizations Greeks hold leadership positions in include Student Government, Campus Activities Board, Orientation Team and Residence Life.
