## INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE

The account seeks a favorable long-term total return, mainly through capital appreciation, primarily from equity securities of medium-sized domestic companies.

## INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The account invests at least 80% of its assets in equity securities of medium-sized domestic companies, as defined by the account's benchmark index (the Russell Midcap<sup>®</sup> Value Index), that appear undervalued by the market based on our evaluation of their potential worth. The account may invest up to 20% of its total assets in foreign investments.
