The United Way campaign kick-off was September 9 and October 28 is the date of the final report meeting. Goal for the year is \$1,001,776.


NEW FACULTY NAMED

DEGREES CONFERRED ON 121 GRADUATES

Summer Commencement exercises were held on Friday morning, Sept. 3 at 10:00 a.m. in the F.I.T. Auditorium. One hundred and twenty-one degrees were conferred at the ceremony.

An honorary Doctor of Science degree was awarded to Mr. Douglas G. Corderman of St. Louis, Missouri, President of National Contract Management Association.

The National Contract Management Association is an organization of 5,000 members with chapters in sixty cities, devoted to education and professionalism in the field of contracts and procurement.

During the past year, the Association has experienced a substantial growth in membership, the addition of many new chapters, a strong financial position, and most especially, an emphasis on education and professionalism.

The man most responsible for this outstanding development, and who provided the inspirational leadership, is Douglas Corderman, the President of N.C.M.A.

He graduated from Dartmouth College in 1952 and received a law degree from Harvard Law School in 1955. NOTES FROM JENSEN BEACH CAMPUS

Another year of successful summer programs at the Jensen Beach Campus has drawn to a close. A total of one hundred and nine students participated in the six programs, two in College Credit Marine Environmental Studies, two in Diving Technology, and two in High School Marine Environmental Studies. These were held from June 20 through July 31 and from June 22 through July 7, respectively, and from August 8 through September 18 and from August 3 through September 18, respectively.

The College Credit Marine Environmental Studies Program was six weeks of research and recreation at Jensen Beach and in the Cayman Islands. A "hands-on" application accompanied all classroom presentations. Laboratory analysis, sampling in various shoreline environs, and at-sea sampling, aboard our fully instrumented oceanographic vessels, was integral to the intent of this unique summer program. A week of diving and underwater photography in the Caymans rounded

out this exciting learning experience.

The six week program in Diving Technology, which was designed as a comprehensive learning experience, incorporated advanced diving, diving physiology, recompression chamber operation, first aid and senior lifesaving. All classroom instruction was followed by practice in the pool, recompression chamber, or in the open water. The final week of this program was also held in the

Caymans.

The life cycles and ecology of some near-shore environs were studies in the intensive two-week learning program in High School Marine Environmental Studies. Actual samplings and classifications were made, and students were introduced to basic ecological principles concerning the effects of pollution, as well as economic aspects of pollution and conservation. In addition to laboratory analysis, cruises aboard the school's oceanographic vessels and snorkeling along the nearby reefs and jetties provided key learning experiences.

Jensen Beach Campus experienced a record enrollment of over one hundred and fifty students for the regular 1976 Summer Quarter.

FOREIGN STUDENTS ADVISOR

The appointment of Miss Joy Dickens as Foreign Students Advisor was recently announced by Dr. Ray Work, F.I.T. Vice President for Student Affairs.

Miss Dickens was born in Philadelphia, Pa. She attended elementary and secondary schools in the United States, Argentina and Chile, obtaining the Junior Cambridge Certi-

ficate. University study included undergraduate work at Butler University in Indianapolis, from which she obtained an A.B. magna cum laude (Phi Kappa Phi in her Junior Year); graduate work at the University of Wisconsin as a Legislative Scholar, M. A. in June, 1938; additional graduate study at George Washington University and Wellesley College.

Miss Dickens entered Foreign Service in Buenos Aires during World War II and served until April, 1948, resigning to accept the post of Professor of English at the National University of

Tucuman in Argentina.

From 1969-72 she was an examiner for USIA, Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service in Washington, D.C. and travelled to key cities to give oral examination for Foreign Service Officer candidates who had passed the written examination.

In November, 1958 with the rank of attache, she was Cultural Affairs Officer at Asuncion, Paraguay, and served as Chairman of the Fulbright Commission. She was detailed to the Department of State in February, 1961 as Regional Programs Officer in the Office of Inter-American Affairs, Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. For five years she served as Educational Exchanges Officer at Madrid and Lima where she also served as a member of the Fulbright Commission.

In 1972, she was appointed First Secretary (Assistant Cultural Affairs Officer) at the American Embassy, Caracas, serving as Acting Cultural Affairs Officer in the absence of the CAO, having primary reponsibility for development of the Educational Exchange Program, (which includes a large International Visitor Program, Voluntary Visitors Program, Foreign Student and U. S. Professor Programs and cooperation with private programs).

Miss Dickens is a member of the Soroptimist Club of Venezuela (the only American), of the Venezuela-American Assocation of University Women (VAAUW), and a member of the Education Committee of the North-American Association of Venezuela.
