Course Description

Forensic clinical psychology focuses on clinical assessment and treatment in a variety of forensic settings. Topics include forensic interviewing and assessment of children and adults, treatment of offenders and victims, legal procedures involving the interaction of clinical psychologists with the justice system, and expert testimony by mental health professionals.

Course Methodology

This senior level course will be conducted in lecture/presentation format.

Attendance & Participation

Attendance & participation are a critical part of your grade. Attendance will not be counted against you per se, but it is difficult to achieve a good participation grade if you are not in class. Team participation will also be assessed and your contributions are directly related to participation. A portion of your participation grade will be evaluated by me and part will be based on evaluation from class and team members.

If, for any reason, you do not sign the attendance sheet as it is being passed around in class, you must take the initiative to come up and sign it at the end of class in order to avoid being considered absent. Falsification of any signature on the attendance sheet will be dealt with in accordance with university policy on academic dishonesty.

To be successful in this course you need to attend class meetings and arrive on time. Except in emergencies, it is impolite and unprofessional to arrive late or to get up and leave during a class meeting without having previously discussed your late arrival or early departure with the instructor. **This class begins at XXX am. Guest speakers may be invited to speak to you on various topics during this course. These practitioners are willing to share their professional experiences to students in the classroom. All courtesies are to be extended and ask questions! Guest lecture material is supplemental information to text reading and classroom lecture and is testable information.

Examinations

There will be three exams during the regular semester. Each will consist of multiple choice and short-answer questions. Exams will be offered to you only at the time they are scheduled. There will also be a comprehensive final exam during final exams week. The final examination is cumulative and required.

There will be no make-up exams given in this course. If an emergency arises and you miss a regular hour exam, the final exam will serve as a make-up. The final exam can be used to

replace any number of missed hour exams, from one to all four. The final exam cannot, however, be used to replace any existing exam scores. I strongly advise all students to prepare for and take each of the regular hour exams.

Students arriving late on an exam day will not be admitted to the classroom. You are responsible for bringing number two pencils and an eraser to exams.

I encourage you to visit our office hours and go over your exams. You may only go over your most recent exam during the period before the next exam is given. For example, you can only go over the first exam before you take the second exam, etc. Students who miss an exam or who choose not to take it may not look over the exam questions they missed.

Papers and other “Deliverables”

There will be several written products completed during this course. Research papers will be in APA and submitted using TurnItIn. “Deliverables” are individual and/or group projects that are completed/developed during the course. Deliverables will be prepared as per the instruction.

Research Papers must be submitted electronically as Microsoft Word documents to the instructor before class on the day they are due. Hard copies of the papers must also be turned in at the beginning of class on the date specified in the course schedule. Papers turned in after that time will be considered late. Late papers will not receive credit. You may turn in your paper anytime before the due date.

Florida Tech has contracted with a private company, TurnItIn.com, to help identify plagiarized papers. Prior to being graded, students must submit papers written for this course to the TurnItIn.com web site for screening. Students must print out the report generated by TurnItIn.com and submit it with their papers. Papers that are submitted without a report from TurnItIn.com will not receive credit.

Academic Dishonesty
