

A testimonial dinner on Dec. 9 was held at the Denius Student Center in honor of Mr. A. E. Hoffmann-Heyden of the R.C.A. Missile Test Project.

"Peter" Hoffman-Heyden has been continuously involved in the systems analysis, engineering improvement and calibration of precision tracking radar since coming to this country from Germany in 1953. During the course of those twenty-two years, he has made many contributions to the advancement of the state-of-the-art in pulse radar technology. Although his activities have been primarily associated with the Eastern Test Range, the results of his work have always been freely


Featured speaker will be E. Cardon Walker, President of Disney World Productions, who will receive an honorary Doctor of Science degree.

### **TERMINAL TO IBM 370**

Students and faculty using the school's IBM 370 computer found last month that they turned in and retrieved their programs on the first floor adjacent to the computer center. They also found that turnaround for most WATFIV programs was about an hour or even less. Dr. Weber and Mr. Brock were able to have a timesharing batch terminal added to provide these improvements in the academic service. The service is manned from 8:30 a.m. until late evening by computer science laboratory personnel. Programming assistance is still provided on the second floor, but none at the first floor terminal.



### F.I.T. HOLDS COLLEGE FLY-IN


On Friday and Saturday, November 14 and 15, F.I.T. hosted six colleges and universities from the Southeastern United States as part of the National Intercollegiate Flying Association's Southeast Region IX Air Meet held at Melbourne Regional Airport. Among those schools participating were Auburn University, St. Petersburg Junior College, Miami-Dade Junior College, Alabama Aviation and Technical College, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Florida Technological University, as well as F.I.T.

There were ten competition events which included power-on and power-off accuracy landings, cross country navigation, aircraft preflight, ground trainer and computer accuracy events.

The U. S. Navy was present with a static display of its latest helicopter and a jet trainer.

The awards banquet was held Saturday night. Special banquet guests included Dr. Jerome Keuper, president of F.I.T. and Professor Harold Wood, Parks College, St. Louis, Executive Director of N.I.F.A. The guest speaker was Capt. Paul J. Slayden, Director of Flight Training for Eastern Airlines. Dean Lauderbaugh presented Capt. Slayden with F.I.T.'s Honorary Master Aviator Award.

The top three schools of the Meet were Embry-Riddle, Miami-Dade and F.I.T.. These three schools are eligible to compete at the National N.I.F.A. Air Meet to be held at Daytona Beach in April.

### **CREW ACTIVE**

Crews from Yale, Princeton, University of Pennsylvania, M.I.T. and Marist College will train at F.I.T.'s Anchorage facilities throughout January and February. A schedule of early dual races will preceed the Engineers' first major regatta in Miami in late March.

An exhibition regatta with five Florida colleges highlighted the Freshman Crew's fall workout program, November 22, at Winter Park. F.I.T. rowed to second place, finishing three seconds behind Tampa University. The race is held each year to give first-year oarsmen a taste of competition before the important championships of the Spring season.

With the start of Winter Quarter, the Freshman Team will be back on the water for ten-mile rows, learning to improve its technique and strength under Coach Norton Schlachter. The Women's Crew, as well as Coach Bill Jurgen's Varsity Team, plan similar Winter schedules starting in early January.

"Normally the Fall race is an unreliable indicator of Spring competition," says Schlachter. "This year, for instance, our Freshmen started learning to row only seven weeks before the race while Tampa has been training since late summer with a group of reportedly experienced men. We don't like to lose any contest, but our main Fall objective is to build a steady base of experience that will pay off in the Spring when the real racing begins."

It's good news, not only for the university, but for Brevard County. Not only does it give the local economy a much needed boost over the next two years, but more significantly, it means that F.I.T. has its foot in the door of the big leagues. It should pay dividends for both F.I.T. students and the community in general for years to come. "As F.I.T. develops along the lines of M.I.T. and Cal. Tech. it will have an enormous economic impact on the area" said President Keuper.

Dr. Andrew W. Revay, Jr., Professor and Head of F.I.T.'s Electrical and Mechanical Engineering Department will serve as Project Director. The F.I.T. electrical and mechanical engineering facilities will be the major contributors.

Much of the work will be done at the F.I.T. Melbourne campus but some of it will be done at the California facility operated by F.I.T. Mr. Leo Tiernan, Research Associate in Electrical Engineering at F.I.T., will serve as chief coordinator with the semiconductor industry.

The automated design capability established by F.I.T. will be used by Navy and Navy contractor system and circuit designers to translate their schematic designs into L.S.I. circuit chips for use on all new Navy aircraft.
