## **DIPLOMAS AWARDED TO 563**

Five hundred and sixty-three students received degrees in **F.I.T.'s** recent spring **commencement** ceremonies. Graduation for **150** students at the Jensen Beach Campus was in the chapel at **3:00** p.m. on Friday, June 9, while the Melbourne campus ceremony was in the gymnasium at **11:00** a.m. the next day. Three hundred and thirteen degrees were conferred at that time.

Four **F.I.T.** off-campus centers awarded a total of **100** degrees at Ft. Eustis and Ft. Lee, Virginia; Rock Island, Illinois; and at **Redstone** Arsenal, Alabama.

Addressing graduates at the Melbourne ceremony was Dr. Hans Mark, Under Secretary of the U. S. Air Force. A noted research physicist and former M.I.T. college professor, Mark also received an honorary doctor of science degree.

At Jensen Beach, two honorary doctorate degrees were conferred. COL Donald A. Wisdom, U.S. Army Corp of Engineers, Jacksonville, Florida District, received an honorary doctor of science dearee after delivering the commencement ad-




dress to graduates and their guests. [Continued to Page 3.1

research project conducted by Miss Dell as a part of her senior course work. Miss Dell, who graduated in June, was the first student to receive a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry from Florida Institute of Technology. The Chemistry Degree Program was started in the fall of 1975.

Mr. Richard Foch, a third year student in mechanical engineering, has been selected by the Florida Academy of Sciences to receive the 1978 Outstanding Student Paper Award for his paper, "An Evaluation of Solar Balloons as Platforms for Scientific Payloads," presented at the spring meeting of the Academy. Dr. Ed **Strother** served as Rick's advisor in the preparation of this paper.

Elizabeth Muntz, head of technical services and acting director of the library, attended the annual meeting of the Cooperative College Library Center in Atlanta on June 6. # DIRECTOR OF MARINE OPERATIONS RETIRES

Climaxing a 12 year association with F.I.T., Bob **Dunlap** is scheduled for retirement on June 30.

"Actually," he told the writer, "my friendship with President Keuper dates back to the early '60's when I was director of the Florida Nuclear Commission. In the course of a typical Keuper whisk around the campus, I was greatly impressed with Dr. Keuper's enthusiasm, and the magnitude and intensity of his ambitions for its development."

"The university was still B.E.C. when I joined it. As Assistant to the President, I enjoyed considerable latitude and widely varied assignments. These included the layout of the irradiator laboratory to satisfy AEC and State Board of Health standards; the inauguration of the F.I.T. rowing program; and the development of the F.I.T. yacht donation program and Melbourne anchorage."

"My role in the crew development has been somewhat exaggerated. Dr. Keuper, with no crew in sight, had ordered two Pocock "eights," and told me to get a rowing program started. Fate brought Coach **Jurgens** into the picture at an early stage. Since then, under his leadership, it has repeatedly asserted its claim to **the** Southeastern Championships and, at this writing, an F.I.T. "eight" is in England to compete in the Royal **Henley** Regatta."

"The yacht donation and management development was a natural. My interest in boating started at age 7, and after graduation from college. I've been professionally involved in almost every phase of the marine field from design, through construction, to delivery and operations. I think it's safe to say that since its inception, F.I.T. has given a good account of itself in its yacht donation program. Its reputation is favorably known from Maine to Texas. Its financial benefit to the university is best known to the Financial Affairs Department."
